States are increasingly exploiting existing interdependencies in their strategic pursuits. Global networks have become a new battlefield, where economic, technological, and security dependencies are weaponized. The very foundations of the liberal world order — free information flows, open trade, and international cooperation — are turning into geopolitical chokepoints.

Yet, as with any new “weapon” there are ways to counter and defuse its impact. In our panel, high-level politicians and leading scientists in the field will discuss what the mitigation of the weaponization of interdependence could look like, and how liberal democracies can restore resilience of open systems.

We will specifically discuss (a) Germany’s role in that context and (b), in relation to this, Europe’s role. One key example is Europe’s Global Gateway initiative and whether it can be seen as a strategic response to the growing weaponization of interdependence. By investing in sustainable, transparent, and values-based connectivity, the EU seeks to transform dependency into resilience and offer a credible alternative to coercive infrastructure and supply-chain control. In doing so, Europe aims to reclaim interdependence as a source of cooperation rather than vulnerability in the global order. But can the Global Gateway truly deliver on this promise and contribute to defuse interdependence?

Guiding Questions

- How can states counter the weaponization of economic, security and technological interdependence without undermining openness and innovation?
- What role can Europe play in strengthening resilience against coercive dependencies while preserving global connectivity?
- Which cooperative mechanisms or norms could help turn interdependence back into a source of stability rather than vulnerability?
- How can German politics not only navigate through but contribute to shape the restoration of the liberal world order?
